The BUF Retreat at Silver Lake

...giving voice to our longing for wholeness through ecological balance, psychological growth, and spiritual creativity

It's so easy to be overcome by the ecological, socioeconomic, and cultural crises we're facing



together. So we'll be drawing on the work of eco-philosopher and Buddhist scholar, Joanna Macy, who has developed processes that can lead us into deeper engagement

with the realities of our struggling world. Our retreat leaders—musicians and friends Christopher Griffen, Gord Oaks, and Josh McHan—have led such programs for groups of 8 to 800, for 20 years. Christopher says:

We'll weave Joanna Macy's "Work that Reconnects" with our own musical offerings for transformation. Together we'll create a space for a wholehearted and interconnected response to these crises. We'll speak, sing, listen, cry (most likely) and imagine together. We'll honor the present and take courage and inspiration from so doing.

Our trio, "rEvolve" offers music that is expansive and progressive in its message, giving voice to the human longing for



wholeness through ecological balance, psychological growth, and spiritual creativity. Our music is acoustic and integrates genres of folk, world, jazz, hip hop, rock, gospel and more.

So come—and bring children, friends, and family! The retreat program will be primarily on Saturday, October 21, but if you can stay overnight Friday thru Sunday, there will be

additional opportunities to play, build community, and breathe the fresh air.

We'll be at the beautiful Saturna Resort waterfront lodge on Silver Lake, an hour NE from Bellingham. Meals will be provided all day Saturday, from breakfast thru our evening program around the fire ring – including s'mores of course! During our free time we can enjoy canoes, paddle boards, and 113 acres of forest to explore.

For those staying overnight, cabins have Queen beds or single bunks with full kitchens, indoor toilets, and hot showers. RV and camping spots are also available. SOCIAL AND ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE

September 15-October 15, Hispanic Heritage Month

National Hispanic Heritage Month celebrates U.S. Latinos, their culture and our history. Started in 1968 by Congress as Hispanic Heritage Week, it was expanded to a month in 1988.

The celebration begins in the middle rather than the start of September because it coincides with national independence days in several Latin American countries: Guatemala, Honduras, El Salvador, Nicaragua and Costa Rica celebrate theirs on Sept. 15, followed by Mexico on Sept. 16, Chile on Sept. 18 and Belize on Sept. 21.

Themes: Latinos Driving Prosperity, Power, and Progress in America. The three themes are all interconnected. Our economic success leads to power and influence, which, in turn, drives further progress for our community. It's a cycle propelling us forward, an exciting time to be a Hispanic in America, and a critical moment to mobilize and equip Corporate America to engage genuinely with Hispanics as employees, suppliers, consumers, and the community. September 17. Marches Begin to End Fossil Fuels

This Sunday, activists kick off a series of climate-change marches on the East Coast, supported by UUs for Social Justice, Create Climate Justice/Side with Love, UU Ministry for Earth and the UUA. The NYC march, largest since the Pandemic, begins Sunday at 1:00 p.m. EST.

Activists want to build on the energy of marches held in 2014 and 2017 and to demand that President Biden take bold action to end fossil fuel dependency.

With wildfire smoke choking the air, hurricanes and floods threatening our homes, and toxic pollution making us sick, it has never been more urgent to end our dependence on the leading cause of these crises – fossil fuels. Whatcom Peace & Justice is celebrating the 20th annual Bellingham International Day of Peace. Recognized by the United Nations since 1982 and the City of Bellingham since 2017, International Day of Peace is a day for all to envision what our world can look like without weapons, violence, and oppression.

This year's theme "Transforming Justice" aims to uplift peaceful ways to address conflict, interpersonal harm, and systemic violence. Transforming Justice is a creative invitation to respond to the surge in domestic and militarized police violence during the pandemic; setbacks in national LGBTQ+ youth protection, labor and reproductive rights, as well as instances of book bans and sex education censorship.

Transforming Justice speaks to the pressing need to reevaluate conventional notions of justice and safety, advocating for preventive, educational, and care-centric strategies to cultivate a peaceful society. Day of Peace includes:

SEJC Special Collections September 2023, BUF Humanitas Ministry



Humanitas is a weekly alms program with the Community Resource Network, reaching out to local citizens who are struggling to rebuild lives turned upside-down as a result of an unfortunate decision or circumstances beyond their control. The need is great and growing. BUF's Humanitas Ministry Action Team provides support to local people in need by listening to their stories and offering limited, emergency,

financial assistance in a safe, warm and non-judgmental atmosphere.

Humanitas updates their work every month with a brief report of their service to needy recipients, which we publish in the MWU. A Humanitas story follows.

Humanitas Ministry in Action

As more states turn the clock backwards, we here in Washington are starting to see Gender Refugees. Which means we are starting to see them at Humanitas as well. They are having to flee their homes because of no longer being allowed to live their lives in safety.

A young man name Al came in not sure where or how to start over. He fled his home in Texas after having spent months inside, feeling like his life was in danger if he went out. Hearing that Bellingham was a haven he came with nothing other than what would fit in a suitcase. We were more than happy to help him with clothing and a list of other resources to help him on his journey.

Unfortunately, his story will become increasingly common. I wish we could say this is unbelievable here in America in 2023 but this is the new reality. Thanks to your continued generosity we can help whoever walks through our doors every week. Details to apply for support appear on the BUF website.

Variety of Pastoral Care Team Opportunities from Paul

I always encourage BUF volunteers to do what makes them come alive. Sometimes this means doing what we do best, sometimes it involves stretching ourselves. So our volunteer opportunities vary from hands-on to organizational to team leadership. And you can support the work of BUF's Pastoral Care Team with different kinds of skills, temperament and time limits.

The Pastoral Care Team is best known for offering one-on-one listening to those experiencing grief and loss. We're not about imparting wise solutions, but being present to your pain and uncertainty. If you would like to be considered for a role like this, please let me know: minister@buf.org. Instead, maybe you simply want to offer your amiability through phone calls to those who haven't been able to get to BUF lately. Did you know that, behind the scenes, several BUF members and friends are each making just a few calls a month to those who have told us they'd like to stay connected this way. Another vital part of our ministry, of course, is providing memorial services. One very practical aspect of support to grieving families is to assist with receptions by bringing food, or simply setting up and cleaning up. Since we don't want to burn out volunteers, we count on a lot of you to do a little bit when infrequently called upon to offer this kind of help...and also to provide a meal periodically to someone going through such loss or a sudden medical challenge. Even more hands-on care? Well, unfortunately we need some volunteers to make this possible. We get periodic requests for rides to BUF on a Sunday morning, or to a medical appointment. I trust that there are willing-ride givers out there, but without someone to coordinate this, the best we can do is to have people put their request on our email list: buf-news. I need to be frank here about BUF staff having more than their hands full: this is something we need a volunteer to coordinate.

Finally, we need some simple administrative support for a new service we'd like to provide to BUFsters. Many of us have done end-of-life planning and have created confidential documents of various kinds: what I'd like read or sung at my memorial service, how I intend for my bequest to BUF to be used, who to call if you haven't seen me in a long time and wonder if I'm ok, and other documents (living wills, intentions for disposition of my body, etc.) that BUF won't be expected to follow-up with, but maybe you want things like this in five different places so one of them can be found when needed. Here, too we need someone to organize, provide info, and sensitively assist. Let me know if you'd like to be considered.

All BUF staff—and those volunteers involved with vulnerable people (children's religious education, for example) or sensitive information—are carefully selected and screened. I'm happy to say that there are many many volunteers here who have shown themselves to be trustworthy and reliable to providing assistance—some for decades. But maybe you're new to BUF, so just start where you are; we're good at providing support to those who support others. Peace,

The BUF auction in February included a paddle call to raise money for the purchase of padded sanctuary chairs. The call raised far more money than expected—enough to replace 6 to 7 rows of pews (or roughly half the pews).

At the Annual Meeting in May, members voted on whether to eventually replace all pews with chairs. We learned that many members like the pews. The majority preferred keeping pews, though the question of how many was not addressed at that time.

As the next step in this project, the Board will host these sessions to explain the paddle call history, and to hear your thoughts. Your input at these sessions will help the Board determine how many chairs will be added to the sanctuary. Please plan to attend.

Pathways for Parents Sessions coming up!!




