WORDS FROM OUR NEW UUA PRESIDENT REV. DR. SOFIA BETANCOURT

I am holding UUs and all of our extended communities close in my heart as we work to find



our way amid the immense struggles and suffering of recent weeks.

I am sitting with photos of intense flooding in FL and reflecting on how each day brings new challenges and a

profound need to be in community. We are living into the impacts of climate disruption in all of its forms – heat, floods, fires, tornadoes, and more. The moral call for a faithful and committed response could not be clearer. This is work we will continue to live into together as a movement.

I also find myself both grieving and determined in response to the renewed wake of violence in this nation – in the threats to our congregations and the devastation in our streets. Racialized violence, resistance to gun control, legislative violence, and the use of fear to promote controlling ideologies are just some of the ways people are being targeted in these heartbreaking times.

I know that I need to remain connected to all of you when the days are difficult. I know that the impact of our response is greater when we ground ourselves in our values and show up together to proclaim that another way is possible. Beloveds, I believe in us. I believe that we can renew the moral witness and prophetic action of the progressive religious left as we join together for all that is to come. The time for us to live the values of our faith every day is right now.

September 15-October 15, Hispanic Heritage Month

National Hispanic Heritage Month celebrates U.S. Latinos, their culture and our history. Started in 1968 by Congress as Hispanic Heritage Week, it was expanded to a month in 1988.

The celebration begins in the middle rather than the start of September because it coincides with national independence days in several Latin American countries: Guatemala, Honduras, El Salvador, Nicaragua and Costa Rica celebrate theirs on Sept. 15, followed by Mexico on Sept. 16, Chile on Sept. 18 and Belize on Sept. 21.

Themes: Latinos Driving Prosperity, Power, and Progress in America. The three themes are all interconnected. Our economic success leads to power and influence, which, in turn, drives further progress for our community. It's a cycle propelling us forward, an exciting time to be a Hispanic in America, and a critical moment to mobilize and equip Corporate America to engage genuinely with Hispanics as employees, suppliers, consumers, and the community. Southern Resident Orca Resolution

Back in May, SEJC attempted to have both the Bellingham City Council and the Whatcom County Council adopt Orca resolutions stating "We urge the governments of Whatcom County and the City of Bellingham to immediately pass Proclamations that in no way compromise or infringe upon Lhaq'temish Treaty rights and do positively affirm and promote the natural rights of qwe'lhol'mechen to exist as they have since time immemorial."

Both councils postponed review of the resolution until September. We're now looking for confirmation of the date when the councils will conduct their review. When

we have the date, we will need to mobilize quickly to appear in person to support the passage of the resolution. So please be ready to attend!! Scent Detection and Orca Study

September 28, What Poop Can Tell Us about of Southern Resident Killer Whales, 7:00 p.m. BUF Sanctuary

Dr. Giles first met the Southern Resident killer whales as a teenager on a trip to the San Juan Islands from California. Upon completing her undergraduate degree, she became a research assistant and began her graduate study specializing in conservation biology and whale behavior, focused primarily on the Southern Resident killer whales.

She serves as the Research Director for Wild Orca, monitoring the Southern Resident killer whales' health. Wild Orca's high-impact conservation research program utilizes non-invasive sampling with Eba, her highly-trained scent detection dog.

"We're stronger together, so we collaborate with the most respected names in wildlife conservation research to paint a near, real-time picture of the health of endangered Southern Resident killer whales, and to provide timely data to the public and management agencies used to understand and address the causes of population decline."

"We Are the Middle of Forever," Climate Change Presentation

October 12. From 7-8:30 p.m. "How, Then, Shall We Live?: Practicing Kinship and Taking the Long View Amidst the Climate Crisis," Majestic Ballroom, downtown Bellingham, 1027 N. Forest St.

SEJC is joining the Multlfaith Network for Climate Justice and other organizations in supporting a Bellingham Friends Meeting presentation by Dahr Jamail.

Dahr Jamail will discuss the gravity of our times from a climate perspective, then share indigenous wisdom from "We Are the Middle of Forever," which provides perspective, grounding, and healing.

Dahr Jamail is an American journalist who was one of the few unembedded journalists to report extensively the 2003 invasion of Iraq. He spent eight months in Iraq and presented his stories on his website, "Dahr Jamail's MidEast Dispatches."

Jamail has been a reporter for Truthout, written for Al Jazeera, and has been a frequent guest on Democracy Now! A recipient of the 2008 Martha Gellhorn Prize for Journalism and the Izzy Award of the Park Center for Independent Media, he writes for Truthout about climate change issues. In January 2019, he published the book *The End of Ice: Bearing Witness and Finding Meaning in the Path of Climate Disruption* about his mountaineering adventures where he witnessed glaciers melting and expressed despair at the future catastrophe of global warming.

The BUF auction in February included a paddle call to raise money for the purchase of padded sanctuary chairs. The call raised far more money than expected—enough to replace 6 to 7 rows of pews (or roughly half the pews).

At the Annual Meeting in May, members voted on whether to eventually replace all pews with chairs. We learned that many members like the pews. The majority preferred keeping pews, though the question of how many was not addressed at that time.

As the next step in this project, the Board will host these sessions to explain the paddle call history, and to hear your thoughts. Your input at these sessions will help the Board determine how many chairs will be added to the sanctuary. Please plan to attend.

I always encourage BUF volunteers to do what makes them come alive. Sometimes this means doing what we do best, sometimes it involves stretching ourselves. So our volunteer opportunities vary from hands-on to organizational to team leadership. And you can support the work of BUF's Pastoral Care Team with different kinds of skills, temperament and time limits.

The Pastoral Care Team is best known for offering one-on-one listening to those experiencing grief and loss. We're not about imparting wise solutions, but being present to your pain and uncertainty. Instead, maybe you simply want to offer your amiability through phone calls to those who haven't been able to get to BUF lately. Did you know that, behind the scenes, several BUF members and friends are each making just a few calls a month to those who have told us they'd like to stay connected

Another vital part of our ministry, of course, is providing memorial services. One very practical aspect of support to grieving families is to assist with receptions by bringing food, or simply setting up and cleaning up. Since we don't want to burn out volunteers, we count on a lot of you to do a little bit when infrequently called upon to offer this kind of help...and also to provide a meal periodically to someone going through such loss or a sudden medical challenge. Even more hands-on care? Well, unfortunately we need some volunteers to make this possible. We get periodic requests for rides to BUF on a Sunday morning, or to a medical appointment. I trust that there are willing-ride givers out there, but without someone to coordinate this, the best we can do is to have people put their request on our email list: buf-news. I need to be frank here about BUF staff having more than their hands full: this is something we need a volunteer to coordinate.

Finally, we need some simple administrative support for a new service we'd like to provide to BUFsters. Many of us have done end-of-life planning and have created confidential documents of various kinds: what I'd like read or sung at my memorial service, how I intend for my bequest to BUF to be used, who to call if you haven't seen me in a long time and wonder if I'm ok, and other documents (living wills, intentions for disposition of my body, etc.) that BUF won't be expected to follow-up with, but maybe

I'm happy to say that there are many many volunteers here who have shown themselves to be trustworthy and reliable to providing assistance—some for decades.
