Last week many people received texts from a scammer using my name (Rev Paul Beckel). The texts—asking people to buy gift cards—gave plausible explanations for this unusual request. To Sing or Not to Sing?

My son and his family attend First Universalist Church of Minneapolis. He sent me their recent newsletter which describes that congregation's deliberations in response to a request made by the composer of a song they sing every Sunday. It wasn't specifically a request to that congregation, but to activists around the world who have been singing her song for decades to promote peace ... but now find themselves on opposing sides.

She asked that no one sing her song unless they have taken a stance in support of a particular political position.

So First Universalist held a congregation-wide conversation about


- respecting a composer's wishes
- political neutrality
- emotional connections to music
- copyright and commodification of music
- the role of ancestors in decision-making
- inclusivity and diversity
- democratic process
- understanding of complex historical and political contexts
- communal and individual rights and responsibilities
- gradual and compassionate transition
- and more....

SOCIAL JUSTICE COLLECTION FOR JUNE 2024: UNBRIDLED SPIRIT

Mission statement: To empower the social-emotional wellness and human connection through equine experiential learning and innovative methods.

Families who face challenges, such as long-term toxic stress and threats to their personal safety and well-being, are invited to the animal farm. Family Respite and Empowerment Events offer an opportunity for the families to relax, for parents to watch their children play and enjoy the animals, to create art and, to share a meal. Parents and children leave the events feeling empowered and hopeful, with stronger connections as a family, with their peers and with nature. It is a model of community care, bridging differences and celebrating life together.

Up to seven families at a time are benefited by three weeks of sessions. Contribution by BUF members will supplement the costs of this service, and evaluation of its outcomes. The organization is prepared to give presentations of their work and a tour of their farm. Volunteers are invited.

Please attend BUF's service on June, 9, 2024 to hear Unbridled Spirit's representative speak about their program and outcomes. Your generous donations to this community well being program can be made throughout June.

BUF SAFETY COMMITTEE UPDATE

For the last five years, BUF has had a Safety Committee working to improve our congregational safety regarding health emergencies, evacuation procedures, intruder issues, natural disasters, and more. Current members of the committee are: Ellie Steele, Sarah Pearson, Michelle Fox, Jim Reimer, Felice Davis, Paul Beckel, and Michael Berres. Approximately 20 behind-the-scenes safety improvements have been implemented at BUF (e.g., coded-door entry systems, door monitors during services, exterior doors armed with 24 hr/day alarm systems, child safety procedures and policies implemented, improved phone systems; data-protection systems, AEDs operationalized, air quality improvements,...).

We have consulted with local agencies/groups (Bellingham Police and Fire Departments) and national groups such as the UUA's departments dealing with safety and individual UU congregations who have expertise to share. While we have made significant improvements, we know that we have a long way to go. One difficulty in doing this work—as affirmed by at least a dozen other UU Congregations—is that churches are essentially volunteer associations and people bring their own druthers as to what to do during emergency situations—very different than public schools and industry, for example, where everyone is mandated to follow specific safety procedures.

Some of our current efforts include:

- 1) Analyzing what worked and what didn't work during BUF's first-ever <u>fire drill practice</u> held on October 15, 2023. Improvements will be incorporated into our next evacuation drill in October 2024.
- 2) Local NAMI experts conducted an April 7, 2024 training for 18 BUF members on <u>mental health concerns</u> that might impact people-in-crisis at BUF—the training focused on ways to deescalate challenging behavior situations.
- 3) Raven CPA delivered a half-day CPR/AED/Scene Assessment training on May 11 to 12 BUF members.
- 4) The Bellingham Police Department will provide training in Nov 2024 or Jan 2025 on dealing with <u>unsafe</u> <u>intruders</u>—an issue faced by too many UU congregations. These four examples are good starts, but will need to be repeated and made available to many more of our congregants. Soon we will disseminate this information through the congregation.
