September Newcomer Pathways to BUF 1 session Felice Davis

Pathway sessions welcome new members, visitors, or anyone interested in knowing more about the UU tradition and BUF. These fun and informative sessions introduce participants to each other, and to Unitarian Universalism.

SOCIAL JUSTICE COLLECTION FOR JUNE 2024: UNBRIDLED SPIRIT

They help individuals face emotions and develop inner strength, families to communicate more effectively and build mutually respectful connections. Students are assisted in schools by having a positive impact on mental wellness and building a belief that one can be successful in life.

STONEWALL UPRISING 55th ANNIVERSARY - Interweave

This June marks the 55th anniversary of the Stonewall Uprising, the event that began the contemporary Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Trans, Queer+ movement. In 1969 same sex attraction was a mental illness, and demonstrating "homosexual" behavior could get one arrested. There was some safety in Gay bars, but customers might be caught in a police raid. On June 28th, 1969, the police raided the Stonewall Inn in Greenwich Village, at the center of New York's Gay bar scene. Usually bar customers would slip away, or act straight. But this night they stood and watched and jeered as the police roughed up and arrested the more conspicuous customers. A woman being arrested called out "Do something!" The crowd threw bottles and rocks and Molotov cocktails and brawled with the police. By dawn, the rioting calmed, but on the next two nights Gays came back. Some fought police. Some discussed using new

tactics to advocate for Gay rights. One year later, in June of 1970, the first Gay rights protest marched from the Stonewall Inn to Central Park. From that riotous beginning emerged our familiar LGBTQ+ Pride Parades, with their rainbow flags and marching bands and church groups.
