August 25 – Holy Change, Rev. Barbara ten Hove with Steffany Raynes In Octavia Butler's prescient sci-fi novels, *The Parable of the Sower* and *The Parable of the Talents*, she creates a religion that believes "God is Change." Whatever our beliefs about God, we certainly know that change is as hard as it is inevitable. What can we learn together about how to navigate change with grace?

As a cellist and vocalist. Ben has taken several tours to Europe as a principal cellist in orchestral settings, has sat principal cello appointments in the Western Washington University Symphony Orchestra, and has directed vocal ensembles ranging from 10 voices to 80-piece full choirs. Even as a child, Ben showed devotion to enhancing every scene in which he played music in one way or another. As a result, Ben has shown disciplined collaborative musicianship and staunch commitment to proper cultural celebration. These were primary motivators through his performance degree work at WWU, continuing his graduate study in music education, and a planned doctorate study in ethnomusicology. The circles offer expanding opportunities for growth and caring within the BUF community: a way to connect at a deeper level than is possible on Sunday mornings and to pursue some of the deeper spiritual questions we rarely take time for in our busy lives.

SEJC Justice Collections Recipient for August - National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI)

The mission of the National Alliance on Mental Illness (<u>NAMI</u>) is to provide hope and improve the quality of life for those affected by mental health conditions, through support, education and advocacy. They envision a world where all people affected by mental health conditions know that they are not alone and live fulfilling lives. Programs and materials of NAMI provide education and training for people with mental health challenges and their families, such as: lived experiences, peer-to-peer support classes, training facilitators, guides, booklets and brochures. Booklets are developed and distributed to participants with mental health challenges free of cost, which is \$11.49 each. Last year 400 booklets were distributed.

BUF's contribution this year will be utilized to cover the cost of resources for a 1,029 participants. Please donate before the end of the month.

Celebration of BUF Congregants' Commitment to our Beloved Community, BUF-SEJC

Dear BUF Community,

For several years now we have been involved in connecting and contributing to our local Whatcom County social justice organizations. You opened your minds and hearts with compassion and made significant financial contributions. In the last ten years (2015-24), our contributions totaled \$215,808. Each month we contribute funds to non-profits in six categories: women/children, poverty/homelessness, environment, peace/human rights, social/economic justice, and health. At the same time we require recipients to show how the funding relates to achieving their program goals and objectives.

The significance of your contributions is beyond funding justice causes, as well. At first we were involved in outreach beyond BUF. Several individuals or teams at BUF made connections and offered their time, skills and efforts voluntarily, to non-profits in the larger community, to support and promote their actions in caring for people and the environment. Your inspiration for action is our shared values and principles such as Justice, Equity, and Interdependence, guided by the spirit of Love.

In recent years, guided by our Beloved Community promise, we broadened the circle of outreach to be inclusive of newer programs and fledgling local organizations. We reached out to you, our congregants, to encourage any such non-profits you know of, to apply for our grants. As a result, in the last few years we netted several organizations serving a diversity of marginalized and previously unfounded categories, for example: Ten Thousand Trees in promoting environmental sustenance, starting with planting trees; Restorative CommUnity Coalition assisting newly released incarcerated people in reintegrating into the mainstream community; Children of the Setting Sun Productions, a youth project in the Lummi Tribal Nation which promotes Native American culture and education programs; IRIS, the immigrant resources and crisis support organization and, PFLAG and the Bellingham Queer Collective supporting and advocating for people of alternative gender identity.

Additional recipients this past year were Northwest Youth Services, Friends of Women's Protection Center Nepal, PNW Plateful, Coffee and Sandwiches Together, Whatcom Peace &

Justice Center, Domestic Violence & Sexual Assault Services (DVSAS) and Unbridled Spirit.

For 2024-25 we had 19 applicants for 10 slots (the other two are set apart for BUF's Humanitas program and Magyarszovat, our Transylvanian partner, and we take an additional collection on Christmas Eve for the Interfaith Coalition). Along with some of the organizations listed above, this year we'll be taking collections for Lydia Place, NAMI, Bellingham Food Bank, and the Airow Project.

Members of BUF - Social and Environmental Justice Committee are deeply in gratitude to you and celebrate your generosity. We will continue to be committed to our Beloved Community, with your support.
