One morning, a young man walked in, clearly distressed. He struggled to express what was wrong. His words were fragmented, his thoughts scattered—each attempt to communicate only added to his frustration. However, we understood that he needed something crucial: to return home to

Alabama. As we spent time with him, patiently narrowing down his request, it became clear that he needed a bus ticket. We learned that he had already gathered three pledges for the ticket from individuals in our network. We decided to match their pledges. Together, we raised enough funds to send him back home—back to the place where he would feel safe again. It wasn't just the ticket that mattered; it was the kindness of our community, and the network of churches and individuals who came together to meet a need in the most compassionate way possible. We are incredibly grateful for the community partnerships that make stories like these possible, and for the reminder that even the smallest act of kindness can make a world of difference.
