
On "generous authority," generosity of spirit, recognizing and owning our power, and why it's necessary to put it to use. Featuring the BUF Chalice Choir.

Treasurer's Report: First Half of the Fiscal Year

Below is the financial snapshot for the 6 months ending December 31, 2024. BUF's income was 117% of the forecast (happily, with no transfer from reserves!), and expense is 109% of the forecast. Pledge income is mostly on plan and non-pledge donations have been stronger than expected. We have been able to restart contributions to reserves. Challenges remain a continuing loss of rental income. Our wonderful congregation has supported us with pledges and contributions that make the whole thing work! We'll see how the remainder of this year unfolds – we have a challenging and exciting year ahead of us next year.

Get to Know Your BUF Building

To welcome newcomers; make BUF a good place for renters; and enhance health, safety, accessibility, security, and energy efficiency

Making Security Easier

Since we keep all exterior doors locked, we require BUF groups and renters to station someone in the entryway to let people in. To discourage their propping the door and walking away, there is now an alarm on the door to alert if the door is propped.

And we've also *made it easier* if groups don't want to stick around forever for stragglers:

If you're hosting an activity, simply write your name and phone number on an orange card (these are next to the door) and hang it so people can read it from outside. Presto! Thank you, and thank you for showing hospitality to renters and BUFsters by showing them this little trick if they seem tempted to prop the door.



Both Energy Efficiency and Security

Before we returned to the building after the COVID shutdown, we spent tens of thousands of dollars on a ventilation system for the sanctuary. It moves massive amounts of air (quietly) and turns on automatically on Sunday mornings (and for intermittent daily refreshers).

But *it needs to be turned* on manually for the sporadic activities throughout the week. Simple instructions are posted on the wall next to each control panel. Letting in cold air by opening windows or propping doors undermines the system's efficiency, so—for health, safety, and energy efficiency—turn on the system early and often when using the sanctuary.

Thank you, and thank you for showing this to others who use the sanctuary—helping both renters and BUFsters to be healthier and comfortable.



Easier Access to Sound Equipment to Enhance Accessibility

When our sound system was stolen a few years back, it wasn't good news, but it did force us to update our ancient equipment (plus lock it down hard, institute new lock-up policies for the whole building, install cameras outside the building, and alarms on all the doors).

One thing to be said for the old system: a person could learn how to use it (the new system takes multiple people with multiple keys, and Ph.Ds.) Soooo...how to *make it easy* for renters and BUF groups who need big sound in the sanctuary?

Our portable sound system, which is fully capable of filling the room, is now locked in place on the sanctuary stage. Just flip a switch, plug in the mic, and be heard! All the necessary parts are right there. Please use the system to ensure that the great program you've prepared is accessible to those who have difficulty hearing. Check with any BUF staff or AV tech for simple instructions or more equipment.

Once you know how to use it, please show other BUFsters, and renters, to help us save on the cost of providing AV staff for miscellaneous activities.

First Aid, Etc.

Several years ago, we installed an AED machine (automated defibrillator) in the social hall. Since then we've held AED trainings (and trainings, too, on de-escalation for people during a mental health crisis). Thanks Dick Kasper, Lawrence Allen, Elie Friedlob, and Sarah Pearson! We'll repeat these trainings annually, so please keep an eye on the newsletter for further info.

Just this month, we installed highly visible First Aid kits on each floor near the restrooms. Thanks Constance Ohana, and Elie. Please take note of where the kits are, now, so you can find them when needed. And let Michelle, our Administrator, know if you take anything from them.

The BUF Safety and Security Team

All of the above (and so much more) has come to be on account of many volunteers (AV, IT, Buildings and Grounds, Boards, Treasurers, Operations Team, so many others), plus staff and your financial contributions.

...And as much as anything: your willingness as a community to make these practices part of BUF culture. And, of course, our Safety and Security Team: Jim Reimer, Elie Friedlob, Felice Davis, Michelle Fox, Michael Berres, and Sarah Pearson—who have instigated, installed, trained, and brought together so many moving parts.





The good news (in addition to all of the above): this team has now created a calendar to ensure that we repeat, review, maintain, etc, all of this on a regular basis. The other good news: this is just a slice of what we've done together in recent years—all of us—to make BUF a safe place, a welcoming place (and an attractive place to rent too).

The other other good news: we are on such a roll that it will be comparatively easy for new volunteers to join the team—as new projects await, and leadership continuity is essential. Please contact Michael Berres (ammab81@gmail.com) to find out more.


Lunch with Paul
