Sunday, March 30, 10:30am - The Science of Gender - Linden Jordan, Steffany Raynes, and Cindy Denchfield

Linden's career has included attorney, mental health counselor, and college professor. Now in his retirement, he works with PFLAG Skagit to support, educate about, and advocate for the LGBTQ+ community, friends, and allies. His goal is to help others understand the complexities of gender which will help our community receive the respect, care, and dignity that they deserve. He is part of the Speakers Bureau and has given over a hundred trainings locally and beyond for making the world a more welcoming place for the LGBTQ+ community.

He will be discussing The Science of Gender. We are taught that it is all so simple, yet nothing could be further from the truth. We will explore the world of in utero development as it applies to the formation of sexual anatomy and our gender identity. You will understand why gender identity is so critical and so interesting. And so misunderstood.

and provide periodic evacuation drills along with first aid, CPR, mental health, and intruder trainings.

First Aid bins: First Aid bins have been installed near the restrooms on each floor for your use. Narcan is included in the bins on the lower level and main level. The AED is located on the lower level in the social hall.

Incident Reports: If you use anything from a first aid bin, or participate in any kind of medical or mental health intervention at BUF (or at a BUF activity), please complete an incident report (located inside the bins) and return it to the BUF office immediately after the event.

The Safety Team's next meeting is Thursday, April 3, 3:00-4:00pm in the Conference Room. Please feel welcome to attend if you are interested in contributing to our safety efforts.

SEJC's March Special Collections Recipient Children of the Setting Sun - Institute

CSS Institute, a think tank, addresses the root causes of declining salmon populations while addressing climate change and social injustice. It takes an applied storytelling approach, conducting qualitative research and documenting oral histories through film and audio.

100 tribal leaders, educators, activists, scholars and supporters gathered at <u>SSI</u>'s 2024 inaugural event at the <u>Inatai Foundation</u> and showcased the new <u>Digital Heritage</u> <u>Library</u> of oral histories, cultural teachings, and traditional ecological knowledge.

It serves as a vital platform for preserving and sharing oral histories, cultural teachings, and traditional ecological knowledge. The SSI Education Program continues to expand its outreach and work with schools throughout the region with resources for Since Time Immemorial, and the state's native studies curriculum. The Hanford Graphic Novel Project uses storytelling to engage Indigenous communities and regional stakeholders in addressing the Hanford Nuclear Complex, the Western Hemisphere's most polluted site. It took on voter outreach, championing democracy with videos targeting Native populations in swing states.
